Artist Statement

As a narrative artist I have always sought stories that inspire the creation of intriguing and/or odd imagery.

Over time the use of myth has led to fables (La Fontaine), his contes (the erotic tales), to proverbs about women, to humor and irony. A parallel investigation of late is the (constant) drôlerie of the fashion world. Continuing in the spirit of «fun», could there be a better source of inspiration with which to clothe the figures in ensuing narratives?

For the past several years all of my work has been drawing based, whether I draw with a needle to combine myriad materials or draw cartoons on ceramic sculptures. Imagining complex narrative thoughts in three dimensional forms has required me to seek symbols for such ideas and has made all of the work more conceptually selective. More and more biomorphic these works reflect the odd demands of my subject matter.
